Students treated to a concert at the 7th St. Theatre

Students throughout Grays Harbor were treated to a concert by the Student Orchestra of Greater Olympia on Friday. The special performance at the 7th St. Theatre in Hoquiam was made possible thanks to a grant from the Goldberg Family Foundation.

Aberdeen's fourth graders from all five elementary schools traveled to enjoy the concert. The Transportation Department coordinated the special bus routes to collect students from all the schools, and the busing costs were covered using local levy dollars.

The concert was a "two-fer" in the sense that local students experienced a live symphony comprised of students close to their own age. And the SOGO students, who played under the direction of Greg Allison, were rewarded with an appreciative audience that packed the historic 7th St. venue.

The 7th St. seats about 600 and there were two performances in order to accommodate the widespread interest from area schools. Aberdeen fourth-graders were joined by students from Hoquiam, Cosmopolis, McCleary and the North Beach.

Selections included Brasstastico, a brass fanfare; Richard Meyer's An American Rhapsody; a comical skit performed to Farandole; highlights from three Harry Potter movie scores, and the grand finale, Elmer Bernstein's The Magnificent Seven.

President Jennifer Durney convened the regular meeting of the Aberdeen School District Board of Directors at 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 20, 2024, in the Community Room at Aberdeen High School. In attendance were Jessica Jurasin, Annica Mizin, Suzy Ritter and Jeremy Wright, along with student representative Mikyla Gunter, Superintendent Jeffrey Thake and 28 patrons and staff. The meeting began with the flag salute.

Consent Agenda

The Board approved the Consent Agenda, which included:

- 1. The minutes from the regular meeting on February 6, 2024;
- 2. January payroll vouchers totaling \$3,980,979.66;
- 3. General Fund vouchers totaling \$859,586.73, ASB Fund vouchers totaling \$6,284.25, and a Private Purpose Trust Fund voucher in the amount of \$11,535.05, and
- 4. An overnight trip request for the AVID Class at Aberdeen High School to travel to Eastern Washington to visit universities on March 20-22.

Public Comment

President Durney noted that the Board had received correspondence from Andrew Workman of Aberdeen regarding cell phone policies at Miller Junior High School and she read public comment received via email from Tamar Yakovich regarding the transition to trimesters at Aberdeen High School.

Superintendent's Report

Levy Update

Superintendent Jeff Thake reported that both the Educational Programs and Operations Levy and the Capital Projects Levy are passing following the Feb. 13 special election. The Board expressed appreciation for the community's support and the work of the Citizens for Aberdeen Schools committee.

Financial Services

Fiscal Status Report

The interim director of business and operations, Elyssa Louderback, presented the Fiscal Status Report for January. She reported that with 41.7 percent of the fiscal year elapsed, the District has received 37.7 percent of revenue and incurred 41.9 percent of expenses. Under enrollment, she reported the 3,139.83 average annual FTE is trending 69.83 above budget.

New Business

CWU Placement Agreement

An agreement with Central Washington University for the placement of student teachers in the district was approved.

Emerald Learning Center

An agreement with the Emerald Learning Center to provide special education and related services for a student in 2024 was approved.

Pacific University Affiliation

An agreement with Pacific University of Forest Grove, Ore., to provide clinical and other learning experiences for students in its education program was approved.

Bates Technical College

The Board approved renewal of the inter-local agreement with Bates Technical College for 2024-2025 which allows Aberdeen students to enroll at the college.

Personnel Report

Following an executive session, the Board approved the Personnel Report.

WA Grant gives more money to more people

<u>Washington College Grant (WA Grant)</u> gives more money to more people for more kinds of education and training beyond high school. WA Grant is not reserved for valedictorians or athletes —it is available to all <u>eligible Washington residents</u>, including undocumented students. If you meet the program and income requirements, you have money waiting for you.

WA Grant can help you access many types of education and training:

- · Public and private colleges and universities
- · Workforce and training programs
- · Approved apprenticeship programs



WA Grant amounts vary based on income, family size, and program cost. An eligible student from a family of four with income of \$73,000 or less per year can get a full award. What does that mean? For example, public college tuition would likely be free for a family with three children and a single parent making \$34 per hour. For middle-income families, grant amounts are lower. But even someone from a family of four making up to \$112,500 per year can get some money to help pay for college or training.

Students and families can use the <u>financial aid calculator</u> to estimate their potential WA Grant award, but the only way to know for sure whether you qualify is to <u>apply for financial aid</u>. Applications for the 2024-25 academic year are now open.
