Goldberg Award presented to Jerry Salstrom

The Aberdeen School Board presented the Jane F. Goldberg Distinguished Service Award to Jerry Salstrom at its meeting on Tuesday to recognize his years of dedication to the children of Aberdeen and the community as a whole.

Mr. Salstrom's service in the Aberdeen School District dates to 1969 when he was hired to teach math. He was the principal at Miller Junior High School from 1989 to 1999. In his retirement, he has

continued to work and volunteer in various roles. He currently is the math tutor in the GEAR UP program at Aberdeen High School.

Most recently, Mr. Salstrom spearheaded the Miller Junior High Centennial Celebration, which became a community-wide event that packed the gymnasium on Jan. 28.

Mr. Salstrom had been asked to attend the School Board meeting to report on the celebration. In his report, he focused on the student and community partnerships that were forged in the months leading up to the event. He recapped the work of the students, teachers and the community members, and he also shared photos from the event. The goal was not just to hold an event. "We wanted it to be an experience – and a lasting experience," he said. "And most importantly a connection with our entire community. … It truly was a community effort."

President Jennifer Durney convened the regular meeting of the Aberdeen School District Board of Directors at 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, January 16, 2024, in the Community Room at Aberdeen High School. In attendance were Jessica Jurasin, Annica Mizin, Suzy Ritter and Jeremy Wright, along with Superintendent Jeffrey Thake and 18 patrons and staff.

The meeting began with the flag salute.

Consent Agenda

The Board approved the Consent Agenda, which included:

- The minutes from the regular meeting on January 16, 2024;
- Annual letter from the Marian Weatherwax Endowment Fund at the Grays Harbor Community Foundation reporting an annual distribution in the amount of \$62,000.00 in support of local programs;
- Gift from the Marian Weatherwax Scholarship Fund at the Grays Harbor Community Foundation in the amount of \$4,000.00 for valedictorian and salutatorian prizes at Aberdeen High School, and

The Board approved an agreement with the Aberdeen Education Association to add a stipend for Honor Society to the co-curricular schedule.

City of Aberdeen announces scholarship nominee

The City of Aberdeen announced this week that Cristal Ramirez Garcia, a senior at Aberdeen High School, is the city's nominee for one of three Association of Washington Cities' Center for Quality Communities scholarships.

Ms. Ramirez Garcia would like to earn a bachelor's degree in elementary education. City Administrator Ruth Clemens said that Cristal shared with the selection committee that she is inspired to

teach because of the "wondershul experience she had in Aberdeen schools as a young child where teachers and staff went above and beyond to help her succeed."

Each AWC member city can nominate one student to compete for a \$3,000 scholarship, Clemens said, adding that AHS provided the committee with a pool of very qualified candidates. The recipients will be announced in March.

Voters in the Aberdeen School District have two special levies on the ballot. Voters have until Tuesday, Feb. 13, to drop off or mail their ballots. Mailed ballots must be postmarked on or before Feb. 13 to be counted.

The two measures the community will decide are:

- 1. Renewal of the Education Programs & Operations Levy, (aka the EP&O levy). This levy funds local programs and activities that are not funded by the state, especially athletics, music, other extra-curricular activities and maintenance. Voters approved this levy four years ago at a rate not to exceed \$2.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The renewal request is for the same tax rate.
- 2. A **Capital Projects Levy**. This is new. The bonds for the high school have been paid off and the School Board is requesting a \$1 per \$1,000 four-year levy for investment in our aging facilities. Capital funds are for projects that improve, upgrade or modernize buildings, which is different than the day-to-day maintenance funded by the regular levy.

How much will it cost?

The estimated combined tax rate of \$3.50 per \$1,000 assessed value for both levies is less than the current rate of \$3.82 per \$1,000 of assessed value. It is estimated the combined rate will decrease to \$3.32 per \$1,000 by the fourth year.

Levy Q & A February 13, 2024

Voters in the Aberdeen School District will decide two levies during the Feb. 13, 2024 special election:

- An Educational Programs and Operations (EP&0) Levy for programs
- A Capital Projects Levy for projects



What will the levies pay for? The EP&O Levy is a renewal of the existing levy, which is expiring. It will continue the community's support for programs such as athletics, music, drama, school counselors, nurses/health assistants, curriculum, technology, building maintenance, and other programs that are either not funded or are underfunded by the state.

The Capital Levy is new and will fund modern upgrades to our aging buildings and technology infrastructure. The bonds for J.M. Weatherwax High School are now paid off. The \$1 per \$1,000 being proposed for building upgrades is less than the annual tax rate was for the high school.

Where do public schools get their money?

About 72% comes from the state, about 18% from the federal government, about 9% from local taxes, and 1% from other sources such as grants or fees.

Why is the District asking for more money?

The current EP&O levy approved four years ago was for \$5,200,000 in each of the four years. This replacement request is for \$5,950,000 per year for the next four years and reflects increased program

Due to the high school bond being paid off, the combined tax rate of both the EP&O Levy and the Capital Projects Levy will not result in a rate increase

Aberdeen School District Levy Q & A / Page Two

How do schools get "local" dollars?

Through voter-approved property taxes such as the two being proposed.

Property owners pay a set amount for each \$1,000 of their property's value (called Assessed Valuation or AV). These levies cannot be increased once approved. Below is the estimated rate per \$1,000 of assessed value for both levies.

Why ask for a Capital Levy and not a Bond?

As you may recall, a bond initiative that was proposed to replace one of our elementary schools at the last election cycle failed by one (1) vote. Bond planning for a new school can take several years. Meantime, we have current facility needs that should be addressed before the next bond initiative for a new school is placed before voters.

When is the vote?

Ballots will be mailed in late January, with all ballots due on or before February 13, 2024.

Do all school districts receive equal state funding?

The state recognizes that some communities have higher property values and can more easily raise funds to support their schools. That is not the case in Aberdeen. For this reason, the state will provide a "match" to districts like ours if the levy passes. In the previous calendar year, the Aberdeen School District received an additional \$2.4 million from the state because voters supported the levy.

This match to our schools is over 3.67% of the total budget and is not available unless the levy is approved.

What programs does the EP&O Levy fund?

All extra-curricular, co-curricular, PE, music, and drama programs are funded with local levy dollars. The elementary swimming program and Outdoor School are supported with levy dollars. In addition, the levy helps fund salaries for staff to improve student learning and other professional development; paraeducator support in the classroom and on the playground; improve and maintain technology in our classrooms; support the services and supplies needed to clean and maintain our buildings and grounds. The levy will also augment school counselor staffing above the state funding model so that services remain available. The capital levy will be used for construction/facility upgrades to continue investing in our existing facilities.

Aren't these items funded by the state under basic education funding?

No. Basic education funds from the state and federal government provide about 90% of the cost of basic education. The funds requested through this levy represent about 9% of the proposed budget for the next four (4) years. When the incentive funds from the state are factored in, the impact on the budget is 12%.

What are co-curricular or extracurricular programs?

These include drama, musicals, the swim program, athletic programs and competitions, performing arts and marching bands, choir, orchestra and other after school activities. These funds also supplement the staff funded by the state to support academic and social emotional support for all students. The levy funds make it possible to provide these opportunities to all students regardless of income.

Apply now: Simpler, more generous 2024-25 financial aid applications now available

A family of four making up to \$120,500 may be eligible for aid.

<u>Financial aid applications</u> for this year's graduating seniors are now available, although students and families should expect some technical issues for the time being. And it will take longer than usual for colleges to get and process applications and respond with financial aid awards.

Applications were delayed this year as <u>updates were made to improve the FAFSA and WASFA</u> forms and increase aid <u>eligibility</u>. In Washington, there are two ways to apply for financial aid. You should only complete one application—the FAFSA or the WASFA:
